

EXISTING FIRE BYLAW

BYLAW NO. 85-2002 SUMMER VILLAGE OF SUNRISE BEACH

Being a Bylaw of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach enacted for the prevention or extinguishing of fires, for the preservation of life and property, the protection from injury or destruction of fire, firefighting costs, recovery and penalties.

WHEREAS Section 7(e) and (f) of the Municipal Government Act, Chapter M 28 of the Statutes of Alberta 2000, provides that a council may pass bylaws for the safety, health and welfare of people and the protection of people and property, imposition of penalties for offenses, as well as services provided by or on behalf of the municipality as may considered proper by Council;

AND WHEREAS Section 553(1)(G) OF THE Municipal Government Act, being Chapter M-26-1 of the Statutes of Alberta 2000, provides that a Council may pass a bylaw making the owner of a parcel liable for costs and expenses related to the municipality extinguishing fires on the parcel, and unpaid costs and expenses for extinguishing fires on the parcel maybe added to the tax roll of that parcel of land;

AND WHEREAS the Forest and Prairie Protection Act, R.S.A. 2000 with amendments thereto, grants certain additional powers and responsibilities to Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, Council may pass bylaws for the prevention of prairies or running fires and the enforcement of the provisions of the Forest and Prairie Protection Act in that behalf;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach pursuant to the powers and responsibilities granted to it pursuant to the Municipal Government Act and the Forest and Prairie Protection Act wishes to provide for the prevention, regulation and control of the lighting of fires within Sunrise Beach and for the preservation of life and property from damage or destruction by fire on the terms hereinafter provided;

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, duly assembled, enacts as follows:

PART 1 - NAME OF BYLAW

1.1 This bylaw may be cited as the "Fire Bylaw".

Part 11 - DEFINITIONS

- 2.1 In this Bylaw:
 - (a) "Apparatus" means any vehicle, machinery, device, equipment or material for firefighting, as well as any vehicle used for transporting firefighters or supplies;
 - (b) "Council" means the Council of Summer Village of Sunrise Beach;
 - (c) "Department" means a Municipal fire department providing coverage to the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach through a formal agreement with the Lac Ste. Anne County or any fire hall operated by the County;

- (d) "Equipment" means any tools, contrivances, devices or materials used by the Department to combat an incident or other;
- (e) "Fire Control Order" means the banning of outdoor fires and may be implemented by either the Minister or a resolution of Council;
- (f) "Incident" means a fire or situation where an explosions imminent or any other situation where there is a danger or a possible danger to life or property or both and to which the department has responded;
- "Incinerator Fire" means a fire that is confined within a non-combustible structure, container or barrel with openings covered with a heavy gauge metal screen having a mesh size not larger than 6 millimeters and which is used for the purpose of burning refuse;
- (h) "Manager" means the Chief Administrative Officer or his/her designate
- (i) "Member" means the Department Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief and members of the department
- "Minister" means the Minister responsible for enforcing the Forest and Prairie Protection Act;
- (k) "Outdoor Fire" means any other fire other than that defined as a Structure Fire and shall include fires involving humus, soil, farm produce, bush, grass, feed, straw, coal or any fire that has escaped or spread from a building, structure, machine, vehicle or incinerator;
- (I) "Structure Fire" means a fire confined to and within any building, structure, machine or vehicle which will or is likely to cause destruction of or damage to such building, structure, machine or vehicle;

PART 111 FIRE CONTROL ORDERS

- (a) The Forest and Prairie Protection Act, Section 21(1), Fire Control Orders, sets out the conditions for the Minister to order suspension or cancellation within any part of Alberta all fire permits or prohibit the lighting or require the extinguishing of a fire set other than under the authority of a permit;
- (b) This bylaw authorizes the council of Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, by resolution. to impose a Fire Control Order in all or part of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach.

PART 1V EXEMPTIONS

A Fire Permit is not required under this bylaw for an attended open fire providing that all of the following conditions are met:

- a) such burning is done in a metal or non combustible container of not less than 210 (two hundred and ten liters) or 2 (two) meters with openings covered with a heavy gauge metal screen having a mesh size not larger than 13 millimeters or a properly constructed fire pit on mineral soil with a sufficiently high containment to prevent dispersal of live ash by wind or an outdoor fire set for the purpose of cooking or obtaining warmth or such burning done by a village employee in the performance of Village maintenance
- b) winds are less than 20 km per hour
- c) a minimum of one (1) adult must be in attendance at all times

- d) sufficient tools, equipment and quantities of water must be readily available for the size of the burn to be conducted
- e) consideration must be given to neighbors as to avoid physical discomfort as a result of burning
- f) the igniter of the fire agrees to indemnify and save harmless the summer village of Sunrise Beach from all liability arising out of the operations of such fire
- g) the fire to be kept under control
- h) the fire is extinguished before it is abandoned.

PART V RECOVERY OF FIRE FIGHTING COSTS

- (a) Where the Department has taken any action whatsoever for the purpose of extinguishing a fire or responding to a fire call or incident in the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach for the purpose of preserving life or property from injury or destruction by fire or other incident on land, including roads within the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, including any action taken by the department on a false alarm, the Chief Administrative Officer or his designate may in respect of any costs incurred by the Department in taking such action, if the Chief Administrative Officer or his designate feels that proper grounds for doing so exist, charge any costs so incurred to the owner or occupant of the land, structure or vehicle in respect of which the action was taken.
- (b) The costs and fees to be charged by the Department for services rendered pursuant to this bylaw shall be as shown on Schedule "A" attached and forming part of this bylaw as determined by Council by resolution from time to time.
- (c) In the event that the owner or occupant of any land within the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach shall feel aggrieved by any action taken by the Chief Administrative Officer or his designate pursuant to Part V(a), such owner or occupant shall have a period of thirty (30) days from the date of mailing of notice of the action taken by the Chief Administrative Officer or his designate to appeal to Council the action taken by the Chief Administrative Officer or his designate and the decision of Council on any such appeal shall be final and binding upon the owner or occupant of the land and shall not be subject to any further appeal.
- (d) In respect of land within the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, in the event that the amount levied by the Chief Administrative Officer or his designate is not paid within sixty (60) days after the date of mailing of a notice pursuant to Part V(a), or in the event of an appeal, within sixty (60) days of the date of mailing of the decision of Council on appeal, the amount levied and unpaid shall be charged against the land upon which the fire was extinguished as taxes due and owing in respect of that land.

PART V1 OFFENCES

(a) No person shall light an Outdoor Fire or a Structure Fire unless he is the holder of a subsisting Fire Permit if required under this bylaw.

- (b) No person shall permit an Outdoor Fire or Structure Fire to be lit upon land that is owned or occupied by him or under his control except when such fire is permitted pursuant to this bylaw
- (c) When a fire is lit under the circumstances described in Part V1(b), the owner or occupant of the land or the person having control of the land upon which such fire is lit shall:
 - (i) extinguish the fire immediately;
 - (ii) where he is unable to extinguish the fire immediately, report the fire to the Department.
- (d) No person shall light an Outdoor Fire, a Structure Fire or an Incinerator Fire without first taking sufficient precaution to ensure that the fire can be kept under control at all times.
- (e) No person shall conduct any activity that involves the use of fire that might reasonably be expected to cause a fire, unless he exercises reasonable care to prevent the fire from occurring.
- (f) No person shall light an Outdoor Fire when weather conditions are conducive to a fire readily escaping out of control.
- (g) No person shall fail to take reasonable steps to control a fire for the purpose of preventing it from spreading onto land other than his own.
- (h) No person shall deposit, discard or leave any burning matter or substance in a place where it might ignite other matter and result in a fire.

PART V11 PENALTIES

- (a) Any person who fails to hold a subsisting Fire Permit when one is required under this bylaw is guilty of an offense and is liable to a fine of \$100.00 on summary conviction for the first offense in any calendar year; to a fine of \$200.00 on summary conviction for the second offense in any calendar year and a fine of \$300.00 on summary conviction for the third and each subsequent offense in a calendar year.
- (b) A person who fails to comply with any provision contained in this bylaw, except for the failure to hold a subsisting Fire Permit which is otherwise provided for under Part V1(a) of this bylaw, is guilty of an offense and is liable on conviction to a fine of not less than\$250.00 and not more than \$1000.00.

PART V111 SEVERABILITY

(a) Should any part of this Bylaw be found to have been improperly enacted for any reason, then such section or part shall be regarded as severable from the rest of this Bylaw and this Bylaw remaining after such severance shall be effective and enforceable as if the part found to be improperly enacted had not been enacted as part of this Bylaw.

Not withstanding any of the preceding conditions, when the "No Open Fires" signs are posted at the entrances to the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, no fires of any kind whether they require a permit or not may be ignited within the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach and any existing fires must be extinguished immediately.

This Bylaw upon taking effect, rescinds bylaw 33-1991.

BEING A BYLAW OF THE SUMMER VILLAGE OF SUNRISE BEACH ENACTED FOR THE PREVENTION OR EXTINGUISHING OF FIRES, FOR THE PRESERVATION OF LIFE AND PROPERTY, THE PROTECTION FROM INJURY OR DESTRUCTION FOR FIRE, FIREFIGHTING COSTS, RECORVERY AND PENALTIES.

WHEREAS Section 7(e) and (f) of the Municipal Government Act, Chapter M 28 of the Statutes of Alberta 2000, provides that a council may pass bylaws for the safety, health and welfare of people and the protection of people and property, imposition of penalties for offenses, as well as services provided by or on behalf of the municipality as may considered proper by Council;

AND WHEREAS Section 553(1)(G) OF THE Municipal Government Act, being Chapter M-26-1 of the Statutes of Alberta 2000, provides that a Council may pass a bylaw making the owner of a parcel liable for costs and expenses related to the municipality extinguishing fires on the parcel, and unpaid costs and expenses for extinguishing fires on the parcel maybe added to the tax roll of that parcel of land;

AND WHEREAS the Forest and Prairie Protection Act, R.S.A. 2000 with amendments thereto, grants certain additional powers and responsibilities to Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, Council may pass bylaws for the prevention of prairies or running fires and the enforcement of the provisions of the Forest and Prairie Protection Act in that behalf;

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach pursuant to the powers and responsibilities granted to it pursuant to the Municipal Government Act and the Forest and Prairie Protection Act wishes to provide for the prevention, regulation and control of the lighting of fires within Silver Sands and for the preservation of life and property from damage or destruction by fire on the terms hereinafter provided;

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, duly assembled, enacts as follows:

PART 1 - NAME OF BYLAW

1.1 This bylaw may be cited as the "Fire Bylaw".

Part 11 - DEFINITIONS

- 2.1 In this Bylaw:
 - (a) "Apparatus" means any vehicle, machinery, device, equipment or material for firefighting, as well as any vehicle used for transporting firefighters or supplies;
 - (b) "Council" means the Council of Summer Village of Sunrise Beach;
 - (c) "Department" means a fire department providing coverage to the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach through a formal agreement with Sturgeon County and/or any applicable aide agreements;

- (d) "Equipment" means any tools, contrivances, devices or materials used by the Department to combat an incident or other;
- (e) "Fire Control Order" means the banning of outdoor fires and may be implemented by either the Minister or a resolution of Council;
- (f) "Incident" means a fire or situation where an explosions imminent or any other situation where there is a danger or a possible danger to life or property or both and to which the department has responded;
- (g) "Incinerator Fire" means a fire that is confined within a non-combustible structure, container or barrel with openings covered with a heavy gauge metal screen having a mesh size not larger than 6 millimeters and which is used for the purpose of burning refuse;
- (h) "Manager" means the Chief Administrative Officer or his/her designate
- (i) "Member" means the Department Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief and members of the department
- (j) "Minister" means the Minister responsible for enforcing the Forest and Prairie Protection Act;
- (k) "Outdoor Fire" means any other fire other than that defined as a Structure Fire and shall include fires involving humus, soil, farm produce, bush, grass, feed, straw, coal or any fire that has escaped or spread from a building, structure, machine, vehicle or incinerator;
- (I) "Structure Fire" means a fire confined to and within any building, structure, machine or vehicle which will or is likely to cause destruction of or damage to such building, structure, machine or vehicle;

PART 111 FIRE CONTROL ORDERS

- (a) The Forest and Prairie Protection Act, Section 21(1), Fire Control Orders, sets out the conditions for the Minister to order suspension or cancellation within any part of Alberta all fire permits or prohibit the lighting or require the extinguishing of a fire set other than under the authority of a permit;
- (b) This bylaw authorizes the council of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, by resolution to impose a Fire Control Order in all or part of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach.

PART 1V EXEMPTIONS

A Fire Permit is not required under this bylaw for an attended Outdoor Fire that is set for the purposes of cooking or obtaining warmth.

PART V RECOVERY OF FIRE FIGHTING COSTS

(a) Where the Department has taken any action whatsoever for the purpose of extinguishing a fire or responding to a fire call or incident in the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach for the purpose of preserving life or property from injury or destruction by fire or other incident on land, including roads within the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, including any

action taken by the department on a false alarm, the Chief Administrative Officer or his/her designate may in respect of any costs incurred by the Department in taking such action, if the Chief Administrative Officer or his/her designate feels that proper grounds for doing so exist, charge any costs so incurred to the owner or occupant of the land, structure or vehicle in respect of which the action was taken.

- (b) The costs and fees to be charged by the Department for services rendered pursuant to this bylaw shall be as shown on Schedule "A" attached and forming part of this bylaw as determined by Council by resolution from time to time.
- (c) In the event that the owner or occupant of any land within the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach shall feel aggrieved by any action taken by the Chief Administrative Officer or his designate pursuant to Part V(a), such owner or occupant shall have a period of thirty (30) days from the date of mailing of notice of the action taken by the Chief Administrative Officer or his/her designate to appeal to Council the action taken by the Chief Administrative Officer or his/her designate and the decision of Council on any such appeal shall be final and binding upon the owner or occupant of the land and shall not be subject to any further appeal.
- (d) In respect of land within the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, in the event that the amount levied by the Chief Administrative Officer or his/her designate is not paid within sixty (60) days after the date of mailing of a notice pursuant to Part V(a), or in the event of an appeal, within sixty (60) days of the date of mailing of the decision of Council on appeal, the amount levied and unpaid shall be charged against the land upon which the fire was extinguished as taxes due and owing in respect of that land.

PART V1 OFFENCES

- (a) No person shall light an Outdoor Fire or a Structure Fire unless he is the holder of a subsisting Fire Permit if required under this bylaw.
- (b) No person shall permit an Outdoor Fire or Structure Fire to be lit upon land that is owned or occupied by him or under his control except when such fire is permitted pursuant to this bylaw
- (c) When a fire is lit under the circumstances described in Part V1(b), the owner or occupant of the land or the person having control of the land upon which such fire is lit shall:
 - (i) extinguish the fire immediately;
 - (ii) where he is unable to extinguish the fire immediately, report the fire to the Department.
- (d) No person shall light an Outdoor Fire, a Structure Fire or an Incinerator Fire without first taking sufficient precaution to ensure that the fire can be kept under control at all times.
- (e) No person shall conduct any activity that involves the use of fire that might reasonably be expected to cause a fire, unless he exercises reasonable care to prevent the fire from occurring.

- (f) No person shall light an Outdoor Fire when weather conditions are conducive to a fire readily escaping out of control.
- (g) No person shall fail to take reasonable steps to control a fire for the purpose of preventing it from spreading onto land other than his own.
- (h) No person shall deposit, discard or leave any burning matter or substance in a place where it might ignite other matter and result in a fire.

PART V11 PENALTIES

- (a) Any person who fails to hold a subsisting Fire Permit when one is required under this bylaw is guilty of an offense and is liable to a fine of \$100.00 on summary conviction for the first offense in any calendar year; to a fine of \$200.00 on summary conviction for the second offense in any calendar year and a fine of \$300.00 on summary conviction for the third and each subsequent offense in a calendar year.
- (b) A person who fails to comply with any provision contained in this bylaw, except for the failure to hold a subsisting Fire Permit which is otherwise provided for under Part V1(a) of this bylaw, is guilty of an offense and is liable on conviction to a fine of not less than\$250.00 and not more than \$1000.00.

PART V111 SEVERABILITY

(a) Should any part of this Bylaw be found to have been improperly enacted for any reason, then such section or part shall be regarded as severable from the rest of this Bylaw and this Bylaw remaining after such severance shall be effective and enforceable as if the part found to be improperly enacted had not been enacted as part of this Bylaw.

Not withstanding any of the preceding conditions, when the "No Open Fires" signs are posted at the entrances to the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, no fires of any kind whether they require a permit or not may be ignited within the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach and any existing fires must be extinguished immediately.

This Bylaw repeals Bylaw #85-2002 and comes into full force and effect upon third and final reading.

A BYLAW OF THE SUMMER VILLAGE OF SUNRISE BEACH, IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, TO CONTROL THE USE OF FIREWORKS

WHEREAS the Municipal Government Act being Chapter M-26 of the Revised Statutes of Alberta, 2000, Part 2, Section 7 & 8 and amendments thereto, authorizes the Council of a municipality to pass bylaws pertaining to the protection of people and property, and

WHEREAS it is deemed desirable and expedient to provide for the control and use of fireworks within the boundaries of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach for the purposes of public safety and protection of property, and

WHEREAS the Council of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach considers it desirable and expedient to do so,

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach, in the Province of Alberta, duly assembled, enacts as follows:

Section 1 - Name of Bylaw

This Bylaw shall be known as "The Fireworks Bylaw".

Section 2 – Purpose of This Bylaw

The purpose of this Bylaw is to increase public safety, reduce risk and protect property.

Section 3 - Definitions

In this Bylaw the following terms (unless the context specifically requires otherwise) shall have the following meanings:

- a) "Council" means the Council of the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach.
- b) "Firecrackers" are defined as small fireworks with entwined fuses used as noisemakers.
- c) "Fireworks" are as defined in the Alberta Fire Code.
- d) "Peace Officer" means a member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, a Special Constable, or a Bylaw Enforcement Officer.
- e) "Public Place" means any highway, road allowance, public beach, reserve, park or building to which the public has, or is permitted to have access or any vehicle in a public place.
- f) "Summer Village" means the Summer Village of Sunrise Beach.

A BYLAW OF THE SUMMER VILLAGE OF SUNRISE BEACH, IN THE PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, TO CONTROL THE USE OF FIREWORKS

Section 4 – Restrictions

- a) No person shall sell fireworks within the municipal limits of the Summer Village.
- b) No person shall fire or set off any fireworks in any public place within the municipal limits of the Summer Village, except with a permit as issued by the municipality.
- c) No person shall fire or set off any fireworks within the municipal limits of the Summer Village when a fire ban is in effect.
- d) Persons or groups firing or setting off fireworks within the municipal limits of the Summer Village shall be responsible for all liabilities incurred by the use of fireworks.
- e) Persons or groups firing or setting off fireworks within the municipal limits of the Summer Village shall do so in accordance with all of the requirements of the Alberta Fire Code which include safety planning, obtaining written permission from neighbors that may be affected and receiving a permit from the Summer Village Office. The Summer Village Office will in turn seek the advice of an accredited Safety Codes Officer for the preparation of the permit.

Note 1: Firecrackers are not allowed to be sold, given away or otherwise distributed, discharged, fired or set off in the Province of Alberta without a ministerial exemption.

Note 2: Nothing in this Bylaw is intended to be in conflict with the Alberta Fire Code and the Alberta Safety Codes Act.

Section 5 – Severability

a) Should any section or part of this Bylaw be found to have been improperly enacted, then such section or part shall be regarded as being severable from the rest of this Bylaw and the Bylaw remaining after such severance shall be effective and enforceable as if the section found to be improperly enacted had not been enacted as part of this Bylaw.

Section 6 - Penalty and Permit Provisions

a) A Peace Officer authorized to enforce this Bylaw under Section 7 of the <u>Municipal Government Act</u>, R.S.A. 2000, Chapter M-26, and who has reasonable and probable grounds to believe that a person has contravened any section of this Bylaw, may under the authority of this Bylaw issue a Municipal tag, and where this tag is not paid by the offender a Part 2 violation tag may be issued under the <u>Provincial Offenses Procedures Act</u> R.S.A., Chapter 2000, P-34, to that person.

- b) Any person who contravenes the provisions of this Bylaw shall be guilty of an offense and liable on summary conviction to the penalty as set out in Schedule "A".
- c) Penalties set out in Schedule "A" may be amended from time to time by a resolution of Council.
- d) Permit fees are set out in Schedule "B" may be amended from time to time by a resolution of Council. The permit application shall be made on the form provided in Schedule "C".

Section 7 - Effective Date

This bylaw shall come into effect upon the date of third and final reading

LAC STE. ANNE COUNTY WEIGHS SUSTAINABILITY OPTIONS FOR TOWN OF MAYERTHORPE

County Council decries proposed 'Mayerthorpe Surcharge' and explores alternatives to biased arbitration process.

Sangudo, Alberta, Monday, June 7, 2021 – Lac Ste. Anne County has completed an initial review of the financial position of the Town of Mayerthorpe to determine a course of action in the wake of stalled Intermunicipal Collaboration Framework (ICF) negotiations with the Town.

The financial review consists of a high-level assessment of publicly-available data, and looks at indicators like expenditure practices and overall financial sustainability compared to benchmarked municipalities with reasonably comparable populations.

Consistent with the measures taken by the County in its own planning and budgeting approach, County Council intends to explore similar opportunities for operational efficiencies, programming changes and ownership models to support sustainable governance of the Town of Mayerthorpe.

Following two years of good faith negotiations, ICF talks ultimately broke down due to the Town of Mayerthorpe's precondition of additional financial support from County ratepayers (the Town was the only municipality that attached a financial stipulation to its ICF negotiations). As mandated by the Municipal Government Act, the County has successfully completed ICF agreements with every adjacent municipality, with the sole exception of the Town of Mayerthorpe.

Lac Ste. Anne County Council cautions that the Town's demand for a steep and incrementally climbing increase in recreation funding would place an unreasonable financial burden on the County and its citizens. During a period of unprecedented and unrelenting financial strain, the County

simply cannot support an increase of taxes on ratepayers in order to compensate for the unaddressed financial management issues of another municipality.

"The longer the County continues to prop the Town of Mayerthorpe up, the longer these inefficiencies will continue to occur," stated Lac Ste. Anne County Reeve Joe Blakeman.

"We are weighing our options on this matter, because everything the Town has put forward to date amounts to a 'Mayerthorpe Surcharge' that would hurt all ratepayers of this region - on an ongoing and incrementally rising basis. I strongly encourage everyone who pays taxes in Mayerthorpe as well as Lac Ste. Anne County to sit up and take notice of what is happening here. Visit mayerthorpesurcharge. ca and look at the numbers yourselves, because any shortfalls will be coming from your pockets if the Town gets its

It is the County's position that the Town of Mayerthorpe's rate of escalation in recreation spending is unsustainable. Overall recreation spending was 2.75 times greater in 2019 than 2014. Over that six-year period, total inflation was 8.53%, and the Town of Mayerthorpe's population has consistently declined.

Spending Raises Questions About Town's Sustainability

While recreation spending was the catalyst for the failed ICF negotiations, the County's review of the Town of Mayerthorpe's financial reporting related to recreation led to further scrutiny of all operating expenses and revenues – and subsequently the financial position of the Town.

In addition to unreasonably high expenditures on recreation, the financial review indicates a financial position that is adversely impacted by unreasonably high expenditures on salaries, wages, and benefits relative to benchmarked municipalities with comparable populations.

"It is evident that Mayerthorpe is out of both money and ideas," continued Reeve Blakeman. "First they sought to balance their books by digging into our coffers. Then they tried (and nearly succeeded) to increase their own ratepayers' taxes by a whopping 15%. Now they seek to drag us through an arbitration process that is all but certain to shake the County down to some degree. These are not the actions of a fiscally sound, sustainable local government."

County Questions Spirit of Arbitration; Explores Alternatives

In a February 26, 2021 media release, Town of Mayerthorpe Mayor Janet Jabush stated that the Town and County have no other options except a costly arbitration process. It should be noted that the cost burden to which Mayor Jabush refers to would be almost entirely borne by Lac Ste. Anne County ratepayers. *

While arbitration may be a desirable and relatively risk-free option for the Town of Mayerthorpe, Lac Ste. Anne County Council is in the process of exploring other alternatives to this costly and structurally biased approach; up to and including amalgamation of the Town.

"By triggering binding arbitration, Mayerthorpe knows they will get to have their cake and eat it too," continued Reeve Blakeman. "Sadly, the system is designed to support such behaviour. Of course Mayerthorpe favours the arbitration process, because they know it means they are all but guaranteed to receive some sort of favourable judgment. Municipal Affairs also supports arbi-

tration because it allows them to check a box and file this matter away. But let's be clear: neither of these parties care whether the average Lac Ste. Anne County ratepayer gets the short end of the stick."

Despite the Town of Mayerthorpe's apparent eagerness
to embark upon what Town
Mayor Jabush described as an
'expensive arbitration process,'
it is incumbent upon Town administrators to explain what
they seek to arbitrate to begin
with. Further, any meaningful
arbitration proceedings would
need to be conducted by an individual who is both qualified
to arbitrate such a matter, and
who is free from conflict and
bias.

Reeve Blakeman posited: "You tell us what the issue is, and we'll tell you if we think that's what the issue is. And then we can discuss who to choose to arbitrate the matter — on the County's dime. Regarding payment of the considerable legal and administrative fees that come with arbitration, perhaps we could earmark some of the \$200,000.00 we give the Town each year."

In the absence of a substantive description of the Town of Mayerthorpe's arbitration position, Lac Ste. Anne County Council will continue to explore opportunities for operational efficiencies, programming changes, and ownership models that will support sustainable operations and programming for Mayerthorpe residents.

* If the Town of Mayerthorpe forces Lac Ste. Anne County into binding arbitration, County ratepayers will be legally responsible for covering 95.09% of all related arbitration costs—in addition to payment of any judgment awarded to the Town.



OPEN LETTER

TO THE RATEPAYERS OF THE TOWN OF MAYERTHORPE & LAC STE. ANNE COUNTY

Mayerthorpe, Alberta, May 26, 2021 - The Town of Mayerthorpe has consistently adopted a cooperative and respectful approach to intermunicipal relationships. We do not intend to depart from the approach but must respond to aspects of the County's May 24, 2021 Open Letter.

- The County pulled out of the recreation services agreement with the Town in 2011. The Town has been open and transparent in the intervening decade about the fact that the County has not been providing a fair contribution to Town recreation services used by County residents.
- The County has chosen to defer dealing with its financial obligations in relation to this important service to its ratepayers. Until the ICF process required the County to come to the table, the Town could only keep the County aware of the inequities of the situation.
- The financial implications of the County's past approach to recreation services may come as a surprise to County ratepayers. County Council has been fully aware of the consequences of the "use now/pay later" approach for an extended period of time.
- Despite the imbalance in the financial relationship for the past decade, the Town worked extremely hard, and entirely in good faith, to find a compromise during the two years of discussion and mediation on the ICF agreement, as required by the Municipal Government Act.
- The Town has not sought contributions for past inequities and has, instead, focused on the future and on trying to build a fair approach to cost sharing between the two communities.
- Right up to February 25, 2021, the Town was under the impression the ICF would be finalized through the mediation process and in compliance with the April 1, 2021 statutory deadline.
- The County chose to pull out of the ICF mediation process without any advance discussion. The Town had no control over that County decision.
- The County was fully aware that the Municipal Government Act would force the municipalities to enter into binding arbitration as a result of that County decision. The County was fully aware that the provisions of the MGA would place the majority of the burden for the costs of the arbitration on County ratepayers.
- The Town regrets that the costs of a binding arbitration have become necessary, but has no control over the County's actions and must comply with the requirements of the MGA.
- The ICF arbitration will proceed within the context of the MGA, which specifically requires municipal operating budgets to include "the amount of expenditures and transfers needed to meet the municipality's obligations for services funded under an intermunicipal collaboration framework" and that one of three primary purposes of the ICF is "to ensure municipalities contribute funding to services that benefit their residents".
- The Town regrets that County Council's decision not to budget for the real, and known, costs of recreation services may now impact County ratepayers during an economic downturn. As noted, that is the result of County Council's chosen approach, not due to any actions taken by the Town.

Despite the issues that must be resolved around Recreation Services, the Town values its relationships with neighbours and will continue to make good faith efforts to build a strong and functional intermunicipal relationship.

We remain committed to providing positive, sustainable recreation opportunities to the County's ratepayers, who are our valued customers. We remain focused on supporting ratepayer health and wellness by ensuring we are in a position to continue to provide recreation services for the Town and the ratepayers of the County who value and use those services. However, a fair funding model to support the provision of those services is long overdue.

Mayerthorpe's Town Council will continue its principles-based approach on this critical matter as we work toward an equitable outcome or our community. The Town of Mayerthorpe has followed the process laid out in the MGA to the letter and in good faith. We will be well & stay safe.

This letter is presented as a token of support on behalf of the Town of Falher towards the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) and also as a motion of opposition to the Provincial Government's recent proposal for an Alberta Provincial Police Force.

Upon review of information made available by AUMA it has become abundantly clear to our entire council that blindly forging forward would come at an enormous cost to our province, and specifically its residents. The newly established Police Funding Model has already delivered a hit to small rural urban municipal budgets with a relatively small impact felt in terms of day to day deliverables in our communities. Continuing with a Provincial Police Force would come at an exorbitant cost with no assurance with a benefit in service.

Just today, S&P Global Ratings has downgraded Alberta's credit rating from 'A+' to 'A' while cautioning that additional downgrades in the near future are very possible if new fiscal measures are not adopted in a post-COVID19 Alberta. The exploration of an Alberta based Police Force was merely financial as there is no evidence suggesting a dissatisfaction with the quality of service offered by the RCMP to the magnitude that would warrant such an expense. To ask any and all residents of this province to fund such an ill-advised endeavour can only be viewed as an un-sound decision based on an act of ignoring facts, and more importantly, the voice of Albertans.

With the Provincial Government's reduction into MSI funding over the next few years and considering the infrastructure maintenance investments that all Canadian municipalities face over the coming years, local government budgets are already being stretched beyond their limits. Where exactly does the Provincial government envision the funding of a Provincial Police Service coming from? Undoubtedly, they will ask municipalities to pay, ultimately forcing local councils to play 'bad cop' by increasing municipal taxes in order to fund Provincial downloading. It is our opinion that the Provincial government needs to seriously re-evaluate its priorities.





Minister,

On behalf of Smoky Lake County Council, I am writing to express our ongoing support for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) as our province's police force. In doing so, I note that we are joining dozens of other rural and urban municipalities in expressing deep concern at the prospect of replacing the same with an Alberta provincial police service (APPS), which the province is currently studying.

During your presentation at the AUMA/RMA Policing Summit in February of 2021, you spoke of Albertans "demanding democratic, community—based policing, a renewed commitment to improving policing in the province, and the need for police to work with community partners and citizens to ensure effective community policing." Minister, I am pleased to say that our community enjoys democratic, community—based policing. Our local RCMP detachment meets with us regularly as part of their commitment to optimal two—way communication that invites, welcomes, and listens to our input, and our detachment also works with our municipality and our citizens as community partners.

The Policing Transition Study being undertaken by our province is in response to the Fair Deal Panel's (FDP recommendation #14: Create an APS to replace RCMP. The FDP reported that 68.5% of respondents were) from Calgary and Edmonton regions. Calgary and Edmonton have their own police services, which should be considered when studying the transition from the RCMP. Another FDP finding was that only 35% of respondents supported the idea of creating an APS.

Finally, in the Alberta Police Federation survey from October of 2020, it was found that "replacing the RCMP is viewed as a least helpful measure tested to improve Alberta's place in Canada." Only 8% say replacing the RCMP helps a lot, only 6% support replacing the RCMP, 81% of Albertans

served by RCMP are satisfied with the service they receive, and 70% of Albertans oppose replacing the RCMP with an expensive new provincial police service.

There is so much convincing support for the RCMP in Alberta, and, with the strong and effective RCMP that serve us well in Alberta. Our Council supports the programs, initiatives, and progress of the RCMP in meeting our community's policing demands. We certainly have not seen compelling evidence that replacing the RCMP would result in better outcomes, particularly considering potentially increased operational (and transitional) costs.

Direct consultation with municipalities regarding the creation of an APPS has been inadequate. If municipalities who are served by RCMP detachments are excluded from this conversation, valuable information and feedback is left.

The Alberta Government already implemented a new police funding model which requires that communities under 5,000 such as ours are already increasingly paying <u>substantially</u> more for policing. Continually doing more with less is untenable.

In closing, I again reiterate our Council's support for the RCMP remaining as Alberta's police force. Smoky Lake County enjoys a positive and collaborative relationship with our local RCMP detachment, and we hope that the province will heed the concerns of many communities, rescind the ongoing study, and instead focus on other more productive options moving forward.

As the City of Fort Saskatchewan has a long-standing history and relationship with the RCMP, we have no desire to transition to a new model. We have an excellent working relationship with our Detachment and the Officer in Charge who consults council annually for our priorities for our community and provides regular and appropriate updates. Community challenges are addressed collaboratively and citizen respect and support for the RCMP remains high in Fort Saskatchewan. Our city has the longest serving police committee in the province which services as an additional community referent group for the RCMP. We find the RCMP to be progressive and receptive in meeting the needs of our city.

As Alberta looks at recovering from the pandemic economy, we strongly believe any efforts focused on a provincial police force are not what municipalities in Alberta need right now. The cost of a provincial police force is not something that municipalities can withstand and nor are we interested in exploring it any further. The City of Fort Saskatchewan currently pays 90 percent of our policing costs and we believe that investment serves our community well now and in the future. We believe the decision of our police force should remain at the local level.

The Alberta Police Federation Survey from October of 2020 found that replacing the RCMP is viewed as the least helpful measure tested to improve Alberta's place in Canada. Only 8 percent say replacing the RCMP helps a lot, only 6 percent support replacing the RCMP, and 81 percent of Albertans served by RCMP are satisfied with the service they receive.

The survey also stated that 70 percent of Albertans opposed replacing the RCMP with an expensive new provincial police force. We are with the majority of Albertans in stating that we have no interest in the creation of a new provincial police force.

In closing, we confirm our support of the RCMP and are opposed to any further exploration of a provincial police force.

RE: Town of Nanton Support for the RCMP

As similarly noted by many other municipalities in recent weeks, Council is disappointed by the Province of Alberta's reluctance to acknowledge the outcome of its own consultative process by continuing with apparent plans to replace the RCMP with an Alberta Provincial Police Service. In this context, we add our support to those positions critical of such plans.

There is little doubt that those employed by either service would provide an acceptable level of police services to Albertans, but the rationale for a transition like this, and the costs it brings, is not at all clear. The local detachment model for small town and rural policing is hanging by a thread – would that be any different under an Alberta Provincial Police Service? Would it generate any more 'boots on the ground' in towns with a population of less than 5,000 or lead inexorably to the precise same urban hub centralization pressures that we are witnessing right now? If effectively recruited and staffed, Nanton's RCMP detachment would serve the local area's needs perfectly well – the hub model of service delivery also deserves a chance to prove itself for regions of the Province where recruitment is really struggling.

The Province's approach to funding the Rural Crime Initiative is arguably a greater threat to local services than the RCMP continuing as the provider of police services. The creation of the "Police Chargeback", which inexplicably lacks the fiscal transparency of a property tax requisition, will eventually hit our municipal tax base hard when the tax room generated by the 2020 cut to the Alberta Schools Foundation Fund requisition in Nanton shrinks further in 2022-23. Including this year, provincial requisitions and charges have represented 20-23 per cent of Nanton's overall property tax bill for the last three years. The journey toward 30 per cent likely begins next year when the Police Chargeback is again increased significantly. This charge has been introduced without evidence or guarantee of any improvement to police services in Nanton. The Police Chargeback would presumably remain whether or not the RCMP remained the provider of police services in rural Alberta.

You are encouraged to once again review the findings of the Fair Deal Panel's consultations and instead work with the RCMP to boost recruitment, retention and commitment to its detachments in such a way that makes the Police Chargeback look like a fiscally defencible fee for service in our communities.







A message from our Big EDD winners, Gerry and John:

Team recognition is always appreciated. Looking back, we began in 2019 with a community concern and interest to know more about invasive species and their control. In short, do something about it. Under the guidance of AISC and Kelly Cooley, Southern Alberta Weed Coordinator we formed a local working group that included the MH Interpretive Program, Grasslands Naturalists, City of Medicine Hat Parks and Recreation, SEAWA, Medicine Hat College, Medicine Hat News, and CHAT TV. We put on an invasive species awareness and education workshop for property owners (homes and businesses). Received a good turnout... build it and they will come! We had fun learning and participating. COVID-19 did put a damper on further progress in 2020, however, during 2019 and 2020 we worked with Dave Genio, Manager of Parks, and his staff to begin a process of searching and reporting invasive species using EDDMaps Alberta - a great stewardship tool. We focused on Eurasian buckthorn whose



locations and distributions were largely unknown. If we found other invasive aquatic, woodland, and grassland species we also reported them. Through EDDMapS, this information was received by Kelly Cooley and Nicole Kimmel, Aquatic Invasive Species Specialist with AENV. This information was then forwarded to our City's weed control staff which included the locations in their follow-up control plans.

It turns out, buckthorn is a common species in the lower draws of coulees and wooded riparian areas. Distribution ranges from singles, small patches, to infestations. From a distance it looks similar to chokecherry, however, upon further awareness, it is significantly different including its opposite leaves and thorns. This species can have a significant negative impact on the environment, wildlife, and humans. Especially, when it "chokes out" desirable native species and habitats. This year, we plan on putting on a COVID friendly Neighbourhood Invasive Species Identification Workshop. John and I will continue to search and find Eurasian buckthorn



in the remaining drainages left to check. We estimate in two years time, this invasive woody species will be fully mapped and most locations known.

Then comes the challenging part for the City to follow up and begin controlling this species using all the tools in the toolbox: mechanical, selective herbicide, and perhaps a new biocide fungus.

Thank you, Delinda Ryerson and Megan Evans, former and present Executive Directors of AISC. Today, Megan and Kelly continue to provide our City with support and advice in controlling the establishment and spread of invasive species. As we know, invasive species are an increasing scenario, and best if we nip in the bud early!

This year, leafy spurge beetles will be the ONLY biocontrol agent available. Get your orders (\$900 plus GST), first come first serve, in **by June 15th**!







ASVA is seeking applications for one representative to sit on AUMA's new Municipal Financial Health Working Group. This working group will provide input on the design of a framework of metrics to assess the financial health of Alberta's municipal governments, which AUMA can use to:

- Educate municipal, provincial, and federal government leaders about municipal government finances.
- Design the methodology for allocation of the Local Government Fiscal Framework.
- Support AUMA's future advocacy initiatives as it relates to municipal finances.

•

The Working Group will consist of 11 members, one representative from ASVA and remaining representatives from AUMA, various types and sizes of municipalities, municipal stakeholder organizations, and a private-sector organization that specializes in municipal finances and audits.

Scope of Work

The working group is tasked with delivering a report to AUMA's Board of Directors that includes:

- Recommendations on a set of metrics that provide a holistic assessment of a municipality's financial health for comparability purposes.
- A summary of risks, gaps, or challenges to measure the financial health of a municipal government.
- Communication materials that members can use to educate stakeholders about municipal finances.
- Recommendations on the methodology for allocation of the Local Government Fiscal Framework.

Working group members will be responsible for reviewing meeting materials and bringing forth ideas, concerns, and opportunities that will help meet the intended deliverables. AUMA staff will be responsible for the supporting research and analysis, and the development of the final report.

Time Commitment

Meetings will be held once per month, or more frequently if needed, and may entail up to full-day participation. Meetings will primarily be held virtually with the possibility of in-person meetings. The working group will begin its work in August 2021 and complete its final report by January 2022.

Representation of Interests

Working group members are expected to consider and present ideas and input based on the interests of the municipal sector as a whole and put the sector's interests above those of their own municipality.

Eliaibility

Eligible applicants include senior administrators and elected officials of a Summer Village in Alberta. Applicants are expected to have a general knowledge of accounting practices, financial statements and reporting, and financial measures as it relates to municipal government operations.

Number of Positions

ASVA will appoint one individual to the working group.
